Major General James Wolfe was commander of the British fleet and was considered an excellent officer.

He is remembered though for his victory over the French in Canada towards the end of the war.

Wolfe was mortally wounded during the siege of Quebec on September 13 on the Plains of Abraham. When Wolfe learned that the British has been victorious, his last words were, "Now God be praised, I will die in peace."

Louis-Joseph de Montcalm-was a French soldier best known as the commander of the forces in North America during the French and Indian War.

He was a career officer and well respected in France. In an incident at Fort Henry, Montcalm accepted the terms of surrender from the British and allowed them to keep their belongings and negotiated to escort them to Fort Edwards. The Indians, Huron and Ottawa to name two did not like the terms for the negotiation because they felt they were not consulted. They entered the fort and scalped many of the British and took their belongings. After that, the Indians did not trust Montcalm. Montcalm too was killed during the siege of Quebec and Quebec surrendered on September 18.

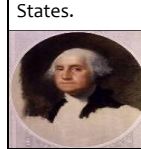

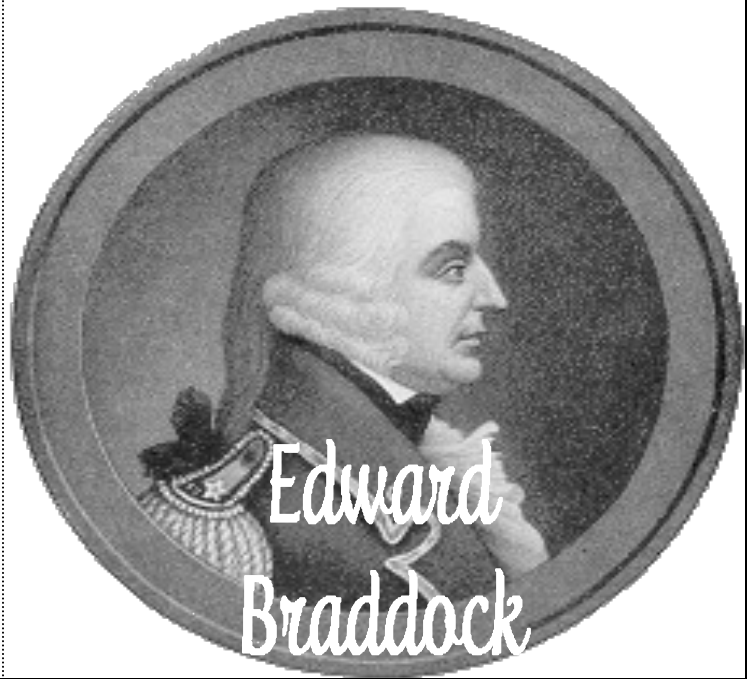
