

The Stamp Act was enacted in March 1765. The colonists were angry. They did not accept that these taxes were necessary for "defraying the expenses of defending, protecting, and securing" the colonies.

It included taxes on everything from newspapers to playing cards to university degrees. Almost every conceivable product made of paper was taxed. Most importantly, it amounted to taxation without representation—the colonists did not have any say in the government that controlled them, so they felt they should not have to pay

Paul Revere was a Patriot who carried news to Lexington that the British were coming.

He was an American silversmith and most famous for alerting Colonial militia of approaching British forces before the battles of Lexington and Concord, as dramatized in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem, Paul Revere's Ride. As a result, his "midnight ride" is a legendary part of United States history.
