

My target age: 4yo to 8yo


I used brown cardstock, but you can use a regular letter size file folder.















Page 8

Cut on outside lines, except for the middle. Be sure to cut through the solid middle line but don't cut all the way through. Then fold accordion style by folding Page 1 OVER, then back, etc. When you get to the end or Page 4, fold that page UNDER page 5. Then accordion fold to page 8. Glue the book to one of the pages inside of your pumpkin cover.




Cut on outside lines.

Next cut away your hole for the squirrel.

Tip: For cutting out the hole in the middle of the pocket, fold the pocket vertically in half with the color part of the pocket **out**. You will now have an edge to start cutting from and will see the line to cut on. It will look like this:




After your child illustrates the story, cut out on outside lines.

Be sure to cut through the solid middle line but don't cut all the way through. Then fold accordion style by folding Page 1 **BACK**, not over like you did in the pumpkin book. Then continue accordion fold. When you get to the end or Page 4, fold that page UNDER page 5. Then accordion fold to page 8. Then place your squirrel in his tree trunk :0)

Cut on outside lines , fold at center. Glue this side to your lapbook or notebook page.




Print on regular paper.



Glue your fresh fall fruit and vegetables to the inside of your produce bag.

Print this cover on white cardstock



Print on regular paper unless you prefer to add their thumb prints here. My son used his thumb and some of the leaves on the inside are his thumb we made into leaves.


After you fill out the questions on the leaf, then glue the gray part down to your lapbook. Add the top part by adding a brad at the stem so the leaf will open and close by sliding right and left.

Answer: Primary Colors are: Yellow, Blue and Red


Red and Yellow make ORANGE

Red and Blue make PURPLE

Blue and Yellow make GREEN




After cutting tabs, crease real well. Then glue under orange part.



Be sure to not get any glue on your tabs.


Have your child draw or write under the tabs what he did during each months or what he looks forward to each season. Too, if you have a photo you can shrink and crop it to a mini size and glue in your book.



With the cold weather coming, some animals will migrate and others will hibernate. On the front cover, the monarch butterfly will migrate and the woodchuck will hibernate. Cut out the book on the outside lines. Then cut the book in the middle on the solid heavy black line to form two tabs that will open from right to left. Then put the animals that will hibernate under the woodchuck and the animals that will migrate under the butterfly. Note: If you have a writer then cut off the printed names on the bottom of the animal pictures on the next page and your child can practice his writing.

Print on regular paper.

Sort the animals that hibernate or sleep in the winter and the ones that migrate or move for the cold winter. Tip: Not all animals migrate North and South. Use the black line to help your little ones as a guide in cutting across.





Hibernate: Bat, chipmunk, Raccoon and Badger


Migrate: Whooping Cranes in South Texas, Hummingbird, Canada Goose and

Earthworm. The earth worm migrates up and down.






Print on regular paper.
