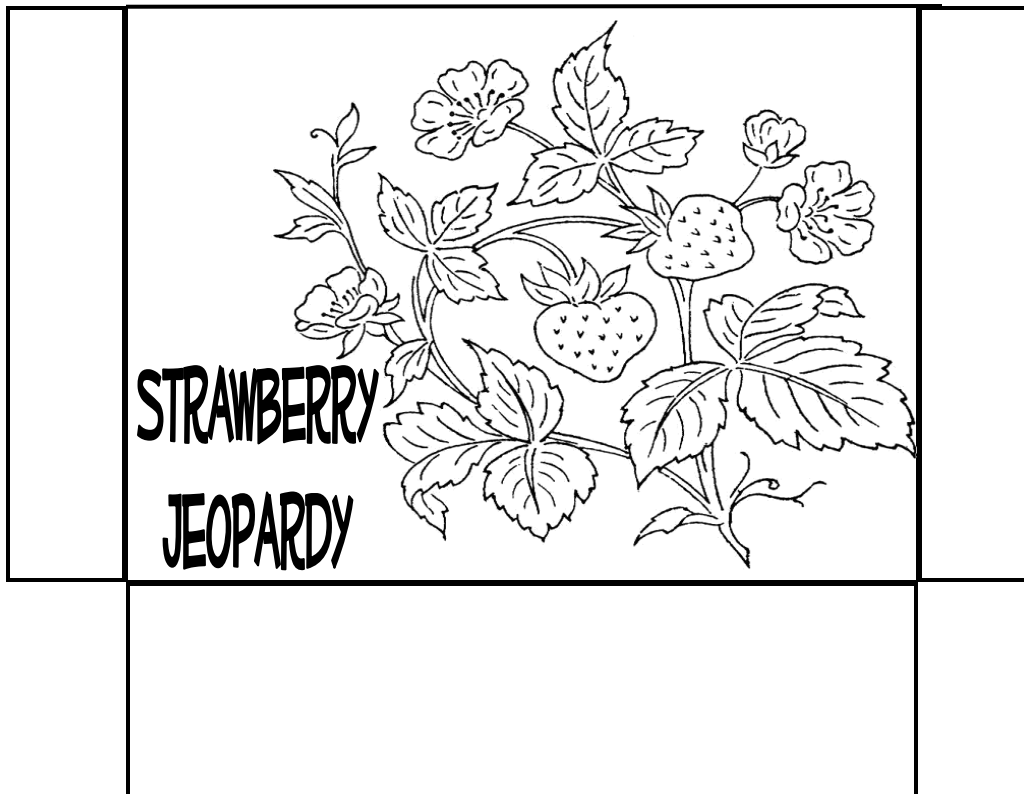

Identify this “enemy” of strawberries. **20 points**



Strawberry Crown Borer: Adult and larva. Even though these weevils have wings they are flightless. They become active in the spring. The larva bore downward through strawberry crowns and the plants are weakened or killed.

What is this berry infected with?

Gray mold. It is one of the most common and serious diseases of strawberries. It is caused by the fungus *Botrytis cinerea*. Infected berries turn light brown and this fungus produces a velvety gray growth.

Name the three main types of strawberries.

**June bearing** - the traditional berry that produces a single crop in June or early spring.  
**Everbearing** - these berries produce two or three crops.  
**Day Neutral** - produces berries throughout the summer months.
